Here's how I got started in the study guide business: In 2005, I was chillin' at our club's Field Day site when Bruce, W8BBS, walked up with his Tech license exam study guide. He had taken each question from the pool and reworded them into statements, then organized them into paragraphs with added text to make it read like a book. We chatted about how many folks had used the study guide to get their licenses and liked his approach. Then we talked about getting the word out so more people could use it. After flipping through it, I volunteered to put it on our club's website. In 2006, Bruce couldn't update his study guide, so he let me do it. That was the first issue of the No-Nonsense, Technician-Class Study Guide. In 2012, the Extra Class one. All three have been updated over time to reflect the latest question pools. Now they're available as PDFs, Kindle files, and ePub files, and eveloper account and versions too, but Apple's being study guide online in 2006 after he couldn't update it himself. This first version was the No-Nonsense, Technician-Class Study Guide. I then made the General Class Study Guide in 2007 and eventually the Extra Class Study Guide in 2012 after some persuasion.
