Masters 2024: Scottie Scheffler Clinches Second Title Amid Emotional Triumph World number one Scottie Scheffler successfully defended his Masters title with an impressive four-stroke victory at Augusta National. The 27-year-old American led overnight by a shot and carded a four-under 68 in the final round to finish on 11 under, securing his second Masters win in three years. Scheffler's commanding performance was marked by rare emotion as he celebrated with tears of joy on the 18th green. The Texan also received congratulations from Augusta patrons, acknowledging that his wife Meredith is due to give birth to their first child soon. During the Green Jacket presentation ceremony, Scheffler addressed his wife, saying, "I love you and I'm coming home. I'll be home as quick as I can." He expressed gratitude for the opportunity to win again at Augusta, especially given that he's about to become a father for the first time. As the pre-tournament favourite, Scheffler demonstrated exceptional form leading up to the Masters, having won two tournaments in three starts and finishing second in another. His impressive performance ultimately proved too much for Sweden's Ludvig Åberg, who finished runner-up on his major debut. Scheffler's composed performance clinched victory at the Masters, leaving Åberg and McIlroy behind. The young American, only turned pro a year ago, demonstrated exceptional skill with clean ball-striking. Fleetwood remained patient despite underwhelming progress from European players and secured a top-10 finish. Rory McIlroy's 10-year wait for his major title continued as he struggled in the challenging conditions. Tyrrell Hatton and Matt Fitzpatrick also failed to capitalize on good starts, while Danny Willett faded away after shoulder surgery. Five-time champion Tiger Woods' return was marked by a poor finish, but packed galleries showed their support despite his struggles. Scheffler's precision on the final hole sealed his win, with Johnson praising his flawless approach and shot selection. He gave everybody a chance to shine, but Scottie Scheffler always came up on top. As Johnson, a seasoned golfer, noted, "There's something very special about Scottie Scheffler." She attributes his success to his faith and perspective, saying he doesn't let golf consume him. Technically, his swing is unusual, but it works for him. What sets him apart is his mental approach, as he plays like golf isn't the most important thing. When he's in a tough spot, he can shift gears and dominate. Now, with two Masters titles under his belt, Scheffler has solidified his reputation as a force to be reckoned with. His rivals know he won't back down, and that aura of invincibility is intimidating. Scottie Scheffler has emerged victorious in the 2024 Masters Tournament, winning by a significant margin. In the final round, he dominated the course and his competitors, sinking several birdies to build an insurmountable lead. Max Homa had a strong finish, but ultimately fell short of claiming the green jacket. As Scheffler teed off on the 18th hole, it seemed inevitable that he would emerge as the champion. He continued to impress throughout the day, showcasing his skill and strategy at Augusta National. His closest rival, Ludvig Åberg, put up a strong fight but ultimately came up short. Meanwhile, other players like Tommy Fleetwood and Jon Rahm also had impressive performances, with Fleetwood finishing in the top five. However, it was Scheffler who emerged as the clear winner, claiming his first major championship title. Additionally, there were several birdie shots and dramatic moments throughout the day that kept fans on the edge of their seats until the very end. At The Masters tournament, Scottie Scheffler took an early lead on the back nine, sinking two birdies to move two strokes ahead of the field. However, his rival Justin Morikawa soon caught up with a double bogey on the 9th hole, putting him just one shot behind. Meanwhile, Åberg stayed in contention by birdieing the 9th, tying him with Scheffler for the lead. Morikawa continued to make progress, converting a birdie attempt and moving back into a tie. However, Scheffler regained his lead with two birdies on the 8th hole, bringing him to 7 under par. Morikawa and Åberg remained in contention as well. Tommy Fleetwood is also making a strong push for contention, birding the 7th hole to move to 3 under par. The leaderboard remains tight, with many players within four shots of the lead. As the round progressed, DeChambeau slowly recovered from a tough start and climbed back into contention with two consecutive birdies on holes 4 and 5. Other notable performances include Åberg's birdie on hole 2 to move to 5 under par, and Cam Smith's eagle on hole 2 to move to 3 under.
